

# Nurseries Day



Since the organisational restructuring of daytime childcare in 2017, the number of nurseries, enrolled young children, and staff working in these institutions has increased significantly in Hungary.

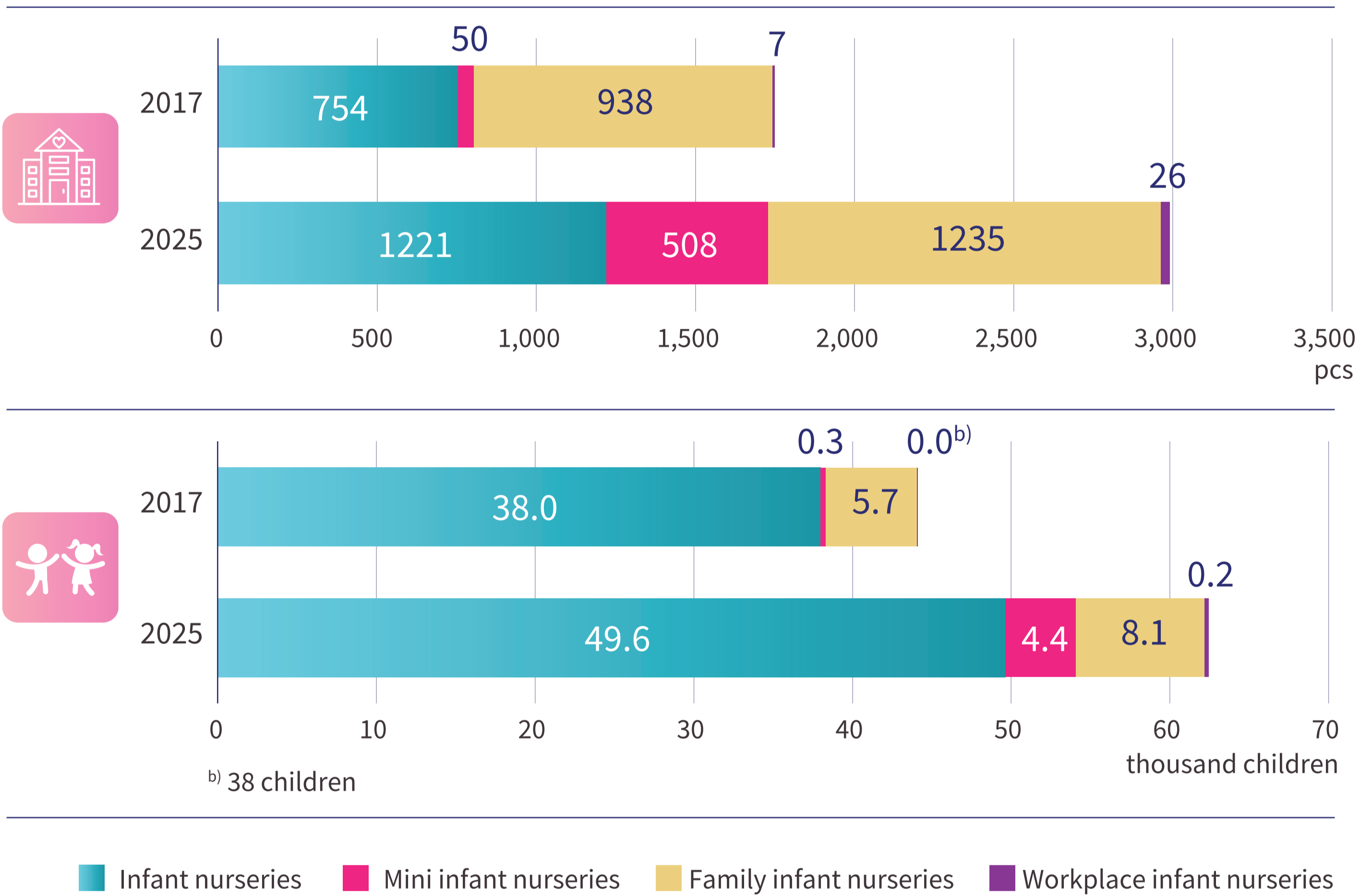

The majority of young children attend infant nurseries. The fastest growth between 2017 and 2025 was recorded in the number of children enrolled in mini-nurseries.



## Trends in the number of nurseries and enrolled children by type of care provision



Legend: Infant nurseries (teal), Mini infant nurseries (pink), Family infant nurseries (yellow), Workplace infant nurseries (purple)



Across the country, 80% of enrolled children were cared for in infant nurseries. Over eight years, the number of districts without a infant nursery decreased from 13 to 1.
